LAMP's History

In 1995, Pastor Brian Kelso developed an officer-training program, after three men approached him with a belief that they had a calling to ministry (these men were not seminary trained, but had a strong desire to serve). By 1997, Pastor Brian expanded the officer training and began his work on a non-traditional strategy for training men within PCA ministries. By 1998, Pastor Brian presented his plan to PCA leaders Cortez Copper, Paul Gilcrest, as well as the Atlanta School of Biblical Studies. After presenting his plan, he was encouraged to develop his work and present it to his Presbytery.

In 1999, the Southern Florida Presbytery approved the LAMP program as an alternative credentialing model. By 2001, LAMP had seven graduates ready for ordination and gospel ministry.

By 2002 LAMP had caught the attention of the Mission to North America (MNA), the church planting & revitalizing ministry of the PCA (Presbyterian Church of America). MNA encouraged LAMP to design the program in a reproducing model that could be used throughout North America. Currently, LAMP Theological Seminary has over 150 learning sites throughout the nation with over 60 students currently enrolled and 50 Graduates.

About LAMP

Mission

The mission of LAMP Theological Seminary is to equip men and women for effective gospel ministry. This gospel ministry will build healthy churches and multiply throughout the un-reached ethnic, cultural, and post-Christian people groups in North America and beyond.

Vision

The vision of LAMP Theological Seminary is to see God, by His grace and for His own glory, through the cooperative prayers and efforts of Christ's Church, to raise up Godly men and women engaged in effective gospel ministry. To ignite a powerful church planting and vitalization movement that has an impact on all of North America and beyond with the Gospel of Jesus Christ and at the same time transforms both the heart and the face of the church. We long to see the nations and communities deeply transformed as the result of people being saved, lives being changed, disciples being made, and needs being met in the name of Jesus Christ.

Unique Aspects

What makes LAMP Theological Seminary unique is its commitment to equipping church leaders without compromising their family life, ministry, occupation, or time. Students will have a reasonable course load with fewer demands on time.

Strategy

The strategy of LAMP Theological Seminary is to train men and women for effective gospel ministry using a practical and reproducible mentor-based model. This mentor-based model focuses on calling, character, competency and practical understanding of biblical and theological content.

What We Believe

- 1. We believe that my one aim in life and death should be to glorify God and enjoy him forever; and that God teaches us how to glorify and enjoy Him in His holy Word, that is, the Bible, which he has given by the infallible inspiration of the Holy Spirit in order that we may certainly know what we are to believe concerning Him and what duty He requires of us.
- 2. We believe that God is a Spirit, infinite, eternal, and incomparable in all that He is; one God but three persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, our Creator, Redeemer, and our Sanctifier; in whose power, wisdom, righteousness, goodness, and truth we may safely put our trust.
- 3. We believe that the heavens and the earth, and all that is in them, are the work of God's hands; and that all that He has made He directs and governs in all their actions; so that they fulfill the end for which they were created, and we who trust in Him shall not be put to shame but may rest securely in the protection of His almighty love.
- 4. We believe that God created man after his own image, in knowledge, righteousness, and holiness, and entered into a covenant of life with him upon the sole condition of the obedience that was his due; so that it was by willfully sinning against God that man fell into the sin and misery in which we have been born.
- 5. We believe that, being fallen in Adam, my first father, we are by nature a children of wrath, under the condemnation of God and corrupted in body and soul, prone to evil and liable to eternal death; from which dreadful state we cannot be delivered save through the unmerited grace of God our Savior.
- 6. We believe that God has not left the world to perish in its sin, but out of the great love wherewith He has loved it, has from all eternity graciously chosen unto Himself a multitude which no man can number, to deliver them out of their sin and misery, and of them to build up again in the world his kingdom of righteousness; in which kingdom we may be assured we have our part, if we hold fast to Christ the Lord.
- 7. We believe that God has redeemed His people unto Himself through Jesus Christ our Lord; who, though He was and ever continues to be the eternal Son of God, yet was born of a woman, born under the law, that He might redeem them that are under the law. We believe that He bore the penalty due to our sins in His own body on the tree and fulfilled in His own person the obedience we owe to the righteousness of God, and now presents us to His Father as His purchased possession, to the praise and glory of his grace forever; wherefore, renouncing all merit of our own, we put all my trust only in the blood and righteousness of Jesus Christ our Redeemer.
- 8. We believe that Jesus Christ my Redeemer, who died for our offenses, was raised again for our justification, and ascended into the heavens, where He sits at the right hand of the Father Almighty, continually making intercession for His people, and governing the whole world as head over all things for His Church; so that we need fear no evil and may surely know that nothing can snatch us out of His hands and nothing can separate us from His love.
- 9. We believe that the redemption wrought by the Lord Jesus Christ is effectually applied to all His people by the Holy Spirit, who works faith in us and thereby unites us to Christ, renews us in the whole man after the image of God, and enables us more and more to die unto sin and to live unto righteousness; until, this gracious work having been completed in us, we shall be received

into glory; in which great hope abiding, we must ever strive to perfect holiness in the fear of the Lord.

- 10. We believe that God requires of us, under the Gospel, first of all that, out of a true sense of our sin and misery and apprehension of His mercy in Christ, we should turn with grief and hatred away from sin and receive and rest upon Jesus Christ alone for salvation; that, so being united to Him, we may receive pardon for our sins and be accepted as righteous in God's sight, only for the righteousness of Christ imputed to us and received by faith alone; and thus only do we believe we may be received into the number and have a right to all the privileges of the sons of God.
- 11. We believe that, having been pardoned and accepted for Christ's sake, it is further required of us that we walk in the Spirit whom He has purchased for us, and by whom love is shed abroad in our heart; fulfilling the obedience we owe to Christ my King; faithfully performing all the duties laid upon me by the holy law of God our heavenly Father; and ever reflecting, in our life and conduct, the perfect example that has been set by Christ Jesus our Leader, who has died for us and granted to us His Holy Spirit just that we may do the good works which God has prepared in advance for us to do.
- 12. We believe that God has established His Church in the world and endowed it with the ministry of the Word and the holy ordinances of Baptism, the Lord's Supper, and Prayer; in order that, through these as means, the riches of His grace in the Gospel may be made known to the world, and, by the blessing of Christ and the working of His Spirit in them that by faith receive them, the benefits of redemption may be communicated to His people; wherefore also it is required of us that we attend upon these means of grace with diligence, preparation, and prayer, so that through them we may be instructed and strengthened in faith, and in holiness of life and in love; and that we use our best endeavors to carry this Gospel and convey these means of grace to the whole world.
- 13. We believe that as Jesus Christ has once come in grace, so also is He to come a second time in glory, to judge the world in righteousness and assign to each His eternal award; and we believe that if we die in Christ, our soul shall be at death made perfect in holiness and go home to the Lord; and when He shall return in his majesty we shall be raised in glory and made perfectly blessed in the full enjoyment of God to all eternity; encouraged by which blessed hope it is required of me willingly to take our part in suffering hardship here as a good soldier of Christ Jesus, being assured that if we die with Him we shall also live with Him; if we endure, we shall also reign with Him.
- 14. The Holy Spirit has taught these truths of Scripture that we confess to His worldwide church through the ages. Therefore, we treasure the confession of these Biblical truths conveyed also in the written summary statements of the classical Reformed creeds (Westminster Confession of Faith and the Larger and Shorter Catechisms, the Heidelberg Catechism, the Canons of Dordt, the Second Helvetic Confession, and the Philadelphia Confession). These written confessions were formulated by Christ's church to answer the needs of the church and the challenge facing her in the travail of her pilgrimage in the way of the Lord.

Academic & Administrative Information

A local Learning Site must be established prior to the acceptance of student's applications.

Admissions Process

All of the below requirements must be approved by Learning Site Coordinator and sent directly to LAMP via mail (18274 NW 21st Street, Pembroke Pines, FL 33029) or email (admin@lampseminary.org) using approved LAMP forms. There is

no official application deadline; all deadlines are subject to each Learning Site. LAMP will accept applicants year-round. However, students should submit documents two weeks prior to class start date. (Contact your local Learning Site for class start dates).

- Application: A completed and signed application available here.
- **Transcripts:** Official transcripts from all institutions attended must be requested by the applicant, usually in writing, and sent directly to Your Local Learning Site.
- **References:** LAMP Training requires one (1) reference from your pastor and two (2) personal references (non-family member). (A helpful hint: provide your references with a LAMP-addressed, stamped envelope to facilitate their timely response!)
- **Biography:** You must submit an autobiography that describes your early life and background. Include your conversion experience, Christian and nonchurch activities and reasons for desiring to attend LAMP, including: Your vision for and call to ministry. Your sense of how you will benefit from and use your training in support of local church ministry.
- **Spouse/Fiancé Statement** (if applicable): Since ministry involves the entire family, please ask your spouse or fiancé to submit a short one page essay that includes his/her testimony and thoughts regarding your pursuit of ministry training.
- **Photograph:** We would appreciate a recent photograph or snapshot of yourself to be sent with your application.
- Application Fee: \$50 non-refundable application fee
- Interview: A personal interview with the Local Learning Site is required for all degree programs. Please contact your Local Learning Site Coordinator to make the necessary arrangements.

Transferring Credits

LAMP may transfer credits from other academic institutions. LAMP transfers a limited number of credits, depending on the course content. LAMP reserves the right to evaluate each course based upon its own equivalency standards. The applicant will receive written notification of transferable courses. The applicant has the right to appeal the course equivalency standards, with supporting information.

Academic Progress

LAMP Theological Seminary expects students to maintain reasonable academic progress. All students must maintain a "C+" average (2.5 GPA) on the above scale of 4.0 in order to graduate.

Policy on Discrimination

LAMP Theological Seminary encourages diversity. We believe in the dignity of people as seen through God's eyes, as His creation without partiality. LAMP is committed to biblical standards of lifestyle and conduct as well as theological standards as express in Westminster Confession of Faith and Shorter & Larger Catechism. Therefore, LAMP reserves the right to evaluate student's base upon Christian characters and theological disposition. LAMP holds to the biblical teaching that the ordained office of pastor/teacher is exclusively for men, we also believe that women should be equipped for ministry in the church.

Accreditation - Authorization

LAMP is in compliance with Section 1005.(6)(f), Florida Statutes, and is therefore not under the jurisdiction or purview of the Commission for Independent Education and is not required to obtain licensure. The degree programs for LAMP are designed solely for religious purposes.

Dialog Session Attendance

LAMP courses normally consist of six dialog sessions. Following this course schedule, the student must complete two lessons prior to the Dialog Session. Because of the shortness of each course regular class attendance is required for all students. Absences and tardiness can be excused but could influence grades, and excess can lead to dismissal from LAMP.

School Calendar

LAMP Theological Seminary uses a quarter system and does not follow a regular school calendar (Spring/Summer/Fall). This allows flexibility for each Learning Site, to schedule courses that best fit their schedules. Library

LAMP Theological Seminary recommends each student to develop a personal library; this library will be a valuable resource for ministry. This personal library should include required/optional textbooks used within the LAMP program.

Financial Information (Students)

LAMP Theological Seminary's goal is to train mature, working, and sometimes economically challenged adults who are active in a local church. The price for a credit hour at a regular seminary can range anywhere from \$300 to \$600. This means that a single course could cost upwards of \$3,000. LAMP's desire is to make seminary training affordable to the student. For this reason most facilitators, mentors and coordinators (faculty and staff) do their work free of charge to the student. Nevertheless, LAMP believes in the biblical teaching that the laborer is entitled his wages, thus the prices of each Learning Site can vary from the below guidelines.

In the event that a student decides to withdraw from a class, LAMP will refund or credit the student in accordance to the following schedule:

LAMP Program Overview

The following is a basic overview of the LAMP program, including an explanation of the five major components:

- ✓ Calling
- ✓ Character
- ✓ Competency
- ✓ Content
- ✓ Credentialing

Calling

LAMP ensures that the student has more than a subjective feeling about his calling. The program focuses on investigating God's Word, in order to discover the essential attributes of a minister. In conjunction with LAMP, the student should be "under care" of his presbytery of church network.

Character

LAMP requires that students be involved in ministry at their local church. Ministry and Life Experience are not charged with credit fees – Though they are credited towards part of the curriculum.

Competency

The student develops ministry competencies and skills in the context of his or her home church. LAMP implements practical competencies in the course syllabus to assure the student is exposed to active ministry.

Content

All courses use reading, writing, and listening (class lectures) to facilitate discussions that are led by an experienced ordained pastor. For each course, the student must engage in self-study, complete all of the assignments, and pass the final exam.

Credentialing

The student's presbytery or church networks will familiarize themselves with the student through all six years of local learning and practice. As the student

progresses through the LAMP Program, the student must follow the credentialing process established by his/her presbytery or church network.

Virtual Cohort Program (VCP)

Since COVID-19 many of LAMP's Learning Sites are using ZOOM to facilitate their Dialog Sessions. This technology has opened a new opportunity for LAMP students to take courses hosted by other Learning Sites across the country and not be restricted to their own Learning Site's schedule of courses.

Hosting a VCP Course

Any LAMP learning site can host a VCP Course. Just notify LAMP Headquarters at least one month in advance of launching a course by clicking on the Host a VCP Course button below. LAMP Headquarters will market the course offering to LAMP students and Learning Sites across the country. LAMP Headquarters will communicate with the Host Site about the VCP students who have registered for the course. The Host Site will facilitate the course as usual and provide LAMP Headquarters the final grades.

Admission Requirements

- ✓ Completed 120 hours of coursework and have a Bachelor Degree from an approved institution
- ✓ Have a minimum GPA of 2.5
- ✓ Consent to the Doctrines of Grace

Degree Requirements

- ✓ Students must pass with a "C" in each course
- ✓ Completion of LAMP core program

Legend

Ministry and Life Experience

MLE101 to 301 CC

Students will receive credit for the time they already spend involved in ministry in their local church. The LAMP Program includes 6 "Ministry and Life Experience" (MLE) courses. These courses are designed to give students credit for their ministry involvement in the local church while going through the LAMP program, and are a requirement as they progress in their studies. This component is one of LAMP's values of training.

Practical Theology

PTH302 CP

Evangelism & Apologetics

This will be a seminary level course of the biblical and theological foundations for evangelism and apologetics in the context of a local church setting. Students will be encouraged to make specific applications of the lectures and assignments to the particular setting of their present or intended ministry. Assignments focus on practical application of workable solutions for evangelism in the local church. Consideration is given to effective responses to objections and questions of the Christian faith. God's redemptive work and reaching out to the world, including all linguistic and ethnics groups; communicating the gospel within a cultural and subcultural context.

PTH304 CP Church Leadership

A study of the life and work of the pastor, elder, and deacon from an historical and biblical perspective. This course will explore in depth the ministry of pastoral care, the work of an elder and deacon.

PTH402 CP Homiletics

Understanding the biblical role of the preacher within the church, with an emphasis on the development of Christ-centered messages, textual exposition, and sermon structure

PTH403 CT

Hermeneutics

Introduce a range of concepts, tools, and methods useful for grasping Scripture in its original context, develop exegetical skills and applying it responsibly in a preaching setting.

PTH601 CP

Worship

Examining the biblical perspective of worship, equipping the student for worship leadership, administering the sacraments, and conducting special services: such as weddings and funerals.

PTH602 CP

Church Discipline & Peace Making

Understand and implementing Biblical principles of conflict resolution and proper church discipline in light of biblical truths.

PTH603 CP Counseling

This course presents the basic principles of counseling through a balanced view of people, problems and solutions in light of biblical truths.

PTH604 CP Christian Education

An overview of the educational and training ministries of the local church including biblical and theological foundations for various settings and age groups (birth to adult life).

Systematic Theology

SYS101 CT

The Doctrine of the Word

Studying Scriptural doctrine, including inspiration, inerrancy, and the principles of biblical interpretation.

SYS102 CT The Destring of

The Doctrine of God

Doctrines of the Triune God and His relation to the created order.

SYS103 CT

The Doctrine of Man

Doctrines of the divine decrees; the creation and fall of man and sin

SYS201 CT

The Doctrine of Christ

The person and work of Christ, the mediator of the covenant of grace.

SYS202 CT The Doctrine of the Salvation

Doctrine of substitutionary atonement, election and union with Christ, with special attention to effectual calling, regeneration, justification by faith, and sanctification.

SYS203 CT

The Doctrine of the Holy Spirit

This course will examine the biblical doctrine of the Holy Spirit.

SYS204 CT

The Doctrine of the Church

Studying the nature, the doctrine, the purpose of the church.

SYS205 CT

The Doctrine of Sacraments

Studying the nature, the doctrine, the purpose of the means of grace.

SYS206 CT

The Doctrine of Last Things

A study based on the views on the end times and the millennium debate.

Old Testament Studies

OTH101 CT History of Redemption

Biblical-theological study of God's self-revelation in the history of redemption, culminating in Christ and the Scriptures. Emphasizing the thematic unity of kingdom, covenant, and mediator; the inspiration and perfection of Holy Scripture, and basic principles of biblical interpretation.

OTH501 CT Hebrew I

An introduction to the language of Biblical Hebrew, including basic grammar, syntax and vocabulary.

OTH502 CT

OT Interpretation and Translation (Hebrew II)

An advanced study of Biblical Hebrew, including basic grammar, syntax and vocabulary.

OTH503 CT OT Biblical Theology I – Genesis through Joshua

A survey and analysis of the historical books of the Old Testament. Examining the history, faith, law, and worship of Israel from Genesis to Joshua.

OTH504 CT OT Biblical Theology II – Judges through the Poets

Survey and analysis of the historical books of the Old Testament and a survey of each book from judges through the poets.

ОТН505 СТ

OT Biblical Theology III – Isaiah through Malachi

Survey and analysis of the message of the prophetical books, principles for interpreting biblical prophecy, within the content of the prophets from Isaiah through Malachi.

New Testament

NTH401 CT

Greek I

A study of the New Testament languages, how to interpret within context, and how the use of Greek language applied to English.

NTH402 CT

Greek II

A study of the old Greek language, including basic grammar, syntax and vocabulary and use of tools (Bibleworks)

NTH403 CT

NT Historical and Biblical Theology I – The Gospel

A study of New Testament history, the gospels, and formation of theology

NTH404 CT

NT Historical and Biblical Theology II – Acts & Pauline Epistles

A study of New Testament history of the Pauline epistles, and formation of theology

NTH405 CT

NT Historical and Biblical Theology III – General Epistles

A study of New Testament history of the General epistles, and formation of theology

Christian Thought

CTH601 CT

Biblical Ethics in a Post-Modern Age

This will be a seminary level course designed to introduce the student to the terminology, major views, and problems in the study of ethics, and a biblical basis for morality. Basic concerns and current issues in social ethics are covered

Historical Thought

HTH601 CT

Ancient and Medieval Church History

The application must include:

- ✓ Identifying the Learning Site Coordinator
- ✓ Listing of Potential Learning Facilitators
- ✓ Listing of Potential Learning Mentors
- ✓ Listing of Potential Trainees
- ✓ Strategic Plan for Local Church Ministry Development: Local Leadership Development Team should submit a strategic plan for the Learning Site
- ✓ Embracement of the LAMP Program: all of the members of the Local Development Team, Coordinator, Facilitators, Mentors, and Ministry Supervisors need to be in agreement with the LAMP Program, Curriculum, Core Values, and Learning Outcomes as described in this catalog.
- ✓ LAMP does not require a site visit to launch a Learning Site; nevertheless, a site visit may be required to start the LAMP Learning Site. Site visits are at the cost and expense of the local leadership launch team. Cost is \$200 per day, plus travel costs and expenses.

The strategy plan and application fee must accompany the application.
